Sustainable clothing brand manufacturers also usually get involved in planet-friendly causes outside their businesses. For instance, they may give a part of their profits to charitable institutions that fight climate change, donate a similar product to the needy for each item you purchase, run a plastic bottle recycling drive, and many others.

 Sustainable clothing makers also ensure that very limited or zero animal material, such as leather, down feathers, angora, and others is used in the manufacturer of their eco-clothing pieces.

Particular to the sustainable fashion industry as well is the conscious effort to use deadstock fabric[3], organic materials (e.g., organic cotton, organic hemp, organic bamboo, etc.), recycled plastic bottles, and 'ocean trash' such as discarded fishing nets.
